


Oregon's Ocean Setting

- Medium width shelf & slope
- Cold, south-flowing California Current
- Seasonal upwelling
- Major fisheries
 - Salmon & tuna
 - Dungeness crab & shrimp
 - Groundfish
- Shipping
- Major recreational opportunities



Ocean Issues and Management

- Small-scale local fisheries 1960s to 1970s
 - State-level management
- Nearshore foreign fishing/drive for "Americanization"
 - FCMA 1976
- Coastal zone focus estuaries, beaches, shores, development
 - Nascent Ocean Policy Goal 19 1976/77
- Threat of oil-gas development
 - WA/OR OCS Lease sale 132 1978
- Marine oil spills 1983 1987 1999
 - Contingency planning

- EEZ Designation 1983
- Mineral Mining Proposals 1983 1989
 - Gorda Ridge polymetalic sulfides
 - Southern Oregon placers
- Comprehensive Area-based Ocean Planning
 - Ocean Resources Management Act 1987
 - Task-force-developed Ocean Plan 1990
 - Legislative adoption 1991
 - Ocean Policy Advisory Council 1991
 - Territorial Sea Plan 1994


- Continuing fisheries crises/responses
 - National Sustainable Fisheries Act
 - State/OPAC response...establish marine reserves
- 2002 OPAC Recommendation for limited system of Marine Reserves
- Ensuing controversy and OPAC Restructuring 2003
- Governor's directives to new OPAC 2005
 - Implement 2002 MR Recommendation
 - Proposed National Marine Sanctuary
- OPAC Marine Reserve Recommendation
- OPAC Marine Sanctuary Process

OPAC's Marine Reserve Recommendation August 16, 2002: A Summary

- Recommended a "limited system" of marine research reserves to "test their effectiveness in meeting marine resource conservation objectives"
- Process to be conducted in two phases:
 - Phase I Planning phase of 2-3 years with local involvement
 - Phase II Designation phase
- Recognition that funding will be a key consideration in success or failure
- No fisheries-specific recommendation was made

Marine Reserve Planning Progress

- 3- NM Territorial Sea
- OPAC process just underway
- Marine Reserve Working Group
- Science panel to be formed
- Public process to be initiated
- Build on lessons learned elsewhere
- Focus on "research reserves"



Governor's Proposed Oregon Coast National Marine Sanctuary Columbia River Estuary Oregon Yaquina Bay Ocean Stewardship Area Coos Bay Would extend from the ocean shore to the outer edge of the continental margin along the entire Oregon coast – about 21,000 square miles

Governor's Proposed Oregon Coast National Marine Sanctuary

Governor's Goal:

To secure the long-term health and stewardship of Oregon's ocean ecosystems, resources, and oceanrelated economy

- Consistent with the findings of the two national ocean commissions on the need for regional, ecosystem-based approach
- We have limited state jurisdiction and capacity to address the size and complexity of the marine ecosystem and diversity of its uses
- New state-federal partnerships and ecosystem-based management are needed to achieve long-term ocean stewardship

Governor's Proposed Oregon Coast National Marine Sanctuary

Benefits foreseen by the Governor:

- Greater influence over federal ocean activities
- Increased ecosystem and fisheries resource protection in federal waters
- More integrated management offshore through a single, multiple-use plan
- Increased capacity and funding for research, longterm ocean monitoring, and education
- Boost for coastal economies

Governor's Proposed Oregon Coast National Marine Sanctuary

OPAC's Role – Preliminary Scoping

- Explain the proposal and gather input
- Assess whether a NMS is the best way to meet the governor's goals for Oregon's ocean ecosystem. If not, what is a preferable alternative?
- Identify key issues to address in the designation process and future management planning
- Provide recommendations to the Governor by January 2007
- PRESENT Status Report Request Findings and Implications
