AN ACT TO AMEND CHAPTER 7, TITLE 54, CODR OF LAWS
OF SOUTH CAROLINA, 1978, RELATINE TO SHIPWRECK
AND SALVAGE OFFER ATORS, BY ADDING ARTICLE 55 OX
TO ENACT THE SOUTH CAROLINA UNDERWATER
ANTIQUITES ACT OF 1931 AND TO PROVIDE PENALTES
FOR VIOLATIONS, AND TO REPEAL ARTICLE 4, CHAPTER
TO PITLE 54, THE SOUTH CAROLINA UNDERWATER
ANTIQUITIES ACT OF 1985.

Whereas, it is the intent of the South Carolina Underwater Antiquities Act of 1991 to preserve and encourage the scientific and recreational values inherent in submerged archaeological historic properties and peleontological properties for the benefit of all the people of the State; and

Whereas, submarged archaeological historic properties and submarged paleontological properties are a nonzenewable and finite resource, and that the conservation and preservation of that resource base is of the highest priority; and

Whereas, it is only incidental to this purpose, and so a means of achieving this purpose, that liceness provided for in the South Carolina Underwater Antiquites Act of [93] may be granted and that portions of the recovered objects may be transferred to the licensees.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina

Underwater Antiquities Act

SECTION 1. Chapter 7, Title 54 of the 1976 Code is amended by adding:

"Article 6

The South Carolina Underwater Antiquities Act

Section 54:7-610. This article may be cited as the South Caroline Underwater Antiquities Act of 1991.




(1) "Artifactal item", or "artifactual material" means any object or assemblage of objects found in an archeological content which yields or is likely to yield information of significance to the scientific study of human prohistory, history, or culture, and which have remained unclaimed for more than fifty years.



The barge is located off Pimlico subdivision, for-The barge is located oil rimited succession, ton-merly Piniliop plantation. After the Revolutionary War, many tracts of land under Loyalist ownership were split up and sold Pinilico was a tract which was formerly part of Mepshaw plantation. It became the property of the Ball registrate plantation. It does the frobject of the bank family, a prominent Cooper River family owning many plantations. Pimhoo was owned by Hugh Swinton Ball who married Anne Channing. They had several children who all died very young. Mr. and Mrs. Ball both died in a fiery explosion abourd the steamer Pulaski on their way to Charles ton from New York in 1838.

The father of Elias Nonus Ball, Elias Octavious Ball, invented the first mechanized nice thraser on Pimlico plantation. It was run by the use of a water wheel shaft instead of the usual pestle.

RICE CULTIVATION

Rice plantations like Pinilico had the benefit of the tidal effects of the river for impation of the fertile swamp-like paddies. The maintenance of retaining mudbanks (dikes) of the paddies and the harvesting and threshing of rice was extremely labor-intensive, und a slave laborforce and the use

extremely tabor-intensive, and a stare favoriorie and use used boats, especially the barge, was a vital part of the economic equation in South Carolina.

After the Civil War, the revival of the "plautation barge" may have occurred at a time when the abandoned nee fields became popular duck hunting preserves. The widespread adaptation of plantations into hunting preserves en sured continued survival of the dike system and the barge well to carry additional cargo or supplies into the mid-20th century


THE PIMLICO BARGE


Barges were basically flat, rectangular platforms of shallow draft and minimal freeboard. They were rowed, poled and propelled by the tide. These work loads operated on plantations and in the calm waters of South Carolina rivers, most often as ferries. They carried people, produce, supplies, staple crops and were also used in later postbellum phosphate mining
